In addition to the launch, there will be workshops throughout both days of the conference where delegates will be able to find out more about the programme. Hospitals currently involved in the pilot phase of the NMCRR will also be on hand to share their experiences.

The NMCRR will develop and implement a standardised structured mortality review process in acute hospitals across England and Scotland during the next 3 years.

Huddling Up for Safer Healthcare—HUSH Update

'Huddling Up for Safer Healthcare' is a three-year project funded by The Health Foundation scaling up patient safety huddles across all acute inpatient wards Leeds, Barnsley and Scarborough.

The ward teams have been getting **exciting results** and recently came together at The Met Hotel in Leeds on 11 August 2016 to learn from each other and celebrate their successes. It has been estimated that, between them, the teams have saved over 1,600 inpatient falls to date.

The HUSH project will be delivering a **huddles workshop** at the SCIMP conference in November "How can I make patient safety huddle work for my area?"
